Lead Senior Counselor, Senior Counselors and Junior Counselors
Job Description

Position Overview:

Counselors at Beaver Creek need not be experts on the Bible, but should have a working knowledge of its contents, especially the New Testament. They must have a positive relationship with our Savior, Jesus Christ, and a desire to bring campers into new or strengthened relationships with Him and His love for all people.

Beaver Creek Christian Camp's Counselors are responsible for carrying out program assignments and supervising campers during camp programs and activity times. They are also responsible for providing a safe, enriching, joyful and Christ-centered experience for campers, consistent with faithful Christian living during the day and at night.

Qualifications:

A commitment to the Christian faith and willingness to live out your faith in word and action. A willingness to teach campers in ways that are consistent with Christian values.

A desire to work in outdoor ministries and to make campers the number one priority during the camp sessions.

Willingness and ability to perform a wide variety of functions and help wherever needed.

The Lead Senior Counselor and Senior Counselors must be at least 18 years old and have at least a high school diploma or GED. Junior Counselors must be at least 16 years old and be in school.

The Lead Senior Counselor and Senior Counselors must pass background checks conducted by the Colorado Bureau of Investigation, the Federal Bureau of Investigation, and Trails.

Counselors will:

Continually assess all aspects of the Christian camp experience for areas of improvement, excellence, and new opportunities.

Be aware and assist campers in following the covenants, rules, regulations, policies or procedures in the Beaver Creek Employee Handbook, Beaver Creek Parent/Guardian Handbook and those that have been implemented after the handbooks and this document were written.

Create a hospitable atmosphere for everyone at Beaver Creek by seeking opportunities to make campers, parents, and others feel welcome and to interact with them in a friendly, accommodating manner.

Take meals with the campers.

Participate with and encourage campers to participate in special activities and programs.

Have the ability, confidence, and knowledge to lead campers in daily Bible study.

Pray in small and large group settings.

Lead and assist campers in leading worship sessions.

Participate in and assist with religious education sessions for campers.

Express faith through actions of forgiveness, servanthood, love, grace and honesty.

Share personal faith stories with campers.

Pursue your own spiritual growth by praying daily, fully entering into worship, fully giving of yourself in Christian service and challenging yourself to find God's blessings in nature and people.

Assist camp management, medical, kitchen and program staff in identifying and meeting special needs of campers, including dietary needs and physical, medical, social, emotional, or mental limitations.

Monitor campers for health and injuries, and involve medical personnel when appropriate.

Counselors are housed (at least two per cabin) with campers to provide for their security and well-being.

Make sure campers practice good hygiene, including brushing their teeth, showering, changing clothes, and washing their hands.

Work with campers to maintain the cleanliness and safety of the cabins, grounds, and activity areas.

Perform other duties and tasks as required.
